The funding may be used for multi-year projects.</p> <p>Who Can Apply</p> <p>Not-for-profit organisations, including charities, constituted community groups, companies and community trusts, based and operating within the UK, are eligible to apply.</p> <p>Eligible Expenditure</p> <p>Funding is intended to support arts, culture, and heritage projects that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provide, enhance, or enrich education. • Unlock creative potential and develop skills to access a career. • Use the arts to develop life skills or support development within a career in the heritage sector. • Equip the next generation to manage a sustainable career. • Introduce young people to the arts and heritage and provide opportunities for progression. • Provide professional training or development.

Organisations are advised to apply as soon as possible. • Successful applicants will then be invited to complete a stage two application. The deadline for stage two applications is 31 March 2022. <p>Funding decisions will be made in May 2022. National Lottery – Grants for Heritage	Up to £5,000,000	Open ~ deadline 24/02/2022	<p>Grants for Heritage</p> <p>The funding will continue to support a broad range of heritage projects and activities, such as industrial sites, castles and historic places of worship, to the stories and memories of communities, and through to public parks, natural landscapes and native wildlife.</p> <p>From April 2021 to March 2022, the National Lottery Grants for Heritage will give priority to heritage projects that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Boost the local economy • Encourage skills development and job creation • Support wellbeing • Create better places to live, work and visit • Improve the resilience of organisations working in heritage <p>In addition, projects will need to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Achieve the Fund's inclusion outcome, involving a wider range of people in heritage. • Demonstrate that they are building long-term environmental sustainability into their plans. <p>Value Notes</p>

<p>Scottish Govt – Victim Surcharge Fund</p>	<p>Up to £discretionary</p>	<p>Open ~ deadline 14/01/2022</p>	<p>Victim Surcharge Fund</p> <p>This fund aims to enable victim support organisations (VSOs) to provide practical support for victims of crime, as well as prescribed relatives, across Scotland. Funding should be used to complement practical and emotional support VSOs already offered to victims. It should supplement and enhance support services, mitigating the negative experience of being a victim of crime and be beneficial for the victim or their family.</p> <p>Value Notes</p> <p>Applications should be for at least £5,000. A total of £165,000 is available for this round.</p> <p>Who Can Apply</p>

			<p>VSOs working in Scotland are eligible to apply.</p> <p>Eligible Expenditure Examples of what funding can be used for includes but is not limited to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Short-term accommodation, temporary rehousing, or the cost of moving to a new house. • Contribution to funeral costs not covered by other sources such as funeral support payments. • Travel costs to a funeral, hospital, or court. • Childcare costs. • Getting locks fixed or new locks fitted. • Fixing damaged doors and broken windows. • Household cleaning, for carpets and upholstery. • Redecorating. • Essential new furniture such as beds or sofas. • Alarms and safety devices. • Psychological support and counselling. • Help with medical and dental costs that have arisen because of being a victim of crime. • Special services for disabled or elderly victims. • Practical, emotional, and social support for children. • Toys and clothing. • Respite breaks and social outings with peers. • Costs of replacing broken or lost personal items such as spectacles. • Cost to replace damaged or stolen electronics. • Replacement of white goods. <p>How to Apply There are two funding rounds per year, depending on the availability of funding.
